- Former EA, Amber Aber, is now policy, public appointments and agencies advisor

NDP MPP RESIGNS SEAT

As she had signalled earlier this year, NDP MPP Laura Mae Lindo officially resigned her seat in the Ontario legislature on July 13th. She represented the Kitchener Centre riding and was first elected in 2018, defeating the incumbent Liberal and then re-elected in 2022. The mother of three children, Lindo had struggled with the lack of childcare for legislators as she commuted weekly between her riding and Queen's Park. She has taken a job at the University of Waterloo. The Premier has six months to set the date for a by-election in the riding.

PC SUPPORT EDGES AHEAD DESPITE DISAPPROVAL ON KEY ISSUES – RECENT POLL

Abacus Data conducted a poll of 1,000 Ontario adults prior to the July 27th by elections. Here are the highlights:

- If a provincial election was held at the time of the survey, 41% of respondents said they would vote PC (up 5% from Abacus' June poll), 24% said they would vote Liberal (down 3%), 23% NDP (down 3%), 7% Green (up 1%), and 5% other (up 1%)
- Tory support is spread evenly across the province except for the North; 36% of respondents in Toronto favour the PCs, 44% in the GTHA, 44% in southwest Ontario, 42% in eastern Ontario but only 25% in the North
- In terms of overall approval or disapproval of Premier Ford and his government, 35% of respondents said they approve while 43 % disapprove
- When asked if Premier Ford and his government are genuinely focused and working hard on 11 key issues, responses ranged from 70% saying not enough focus on housing affordability to 43% saying not enough focus on improving public transit; the government was underwater on all 11 issues
- Respondents were asked to grade the government's performance between 1 to 10 on the same 11 key issues and the average responses on each issue ranged from 3.3 on "making life more affordable for you" to 4.5 for "improving public transit".
- 54% of respondents said the decisions made by Premier Ford and his government have been made primarily for what's in the best interest of his friends and supporters while 27% said decisions have been made for the best interest of people living in Ontario

ARBITRATOR AWARDS INCREASE TO HOSPITAL NURSES & HEALTHCARE WORKERS

An arbitrator awarded nurses and healthcare workers in Ontario hospitals with an average 11% wage increase over two years. Bill 124, which became law on November 7, 2019, limited broader public sector wage increases to 1% per year for three years and the arbitrator's award was the first labour settlement since the Bill's expiration period.

The courts found Bill 124 to be unconstitutional, a decision being appealed by the government. If Bill 124 is overturned, additional increases could be due across the affected workforce.

LIBERALS SWEEP ONTARIO'S TWO BY-ELECTIONS

The Liberal Party of Ontario won both Ontario by-elections held yesterday.

In Kanata-Carleton, a riding that former PC MPP and cabinet minister, Merrilee Fullerton won handily with more than 43% of the vote in 2018 and 2022, former Liberal MP Karen McCrimmon narrowly defeated Tory candidate Sean Webster with 35.35% of the vote to Webster's 32.33% or a little more than 600 votes.

The Tories campaigned hard for Webster in an attempt to keep the riding in the blue column but those with their thumbs on the pulse of the riding believe that Ford's inaction during the truckers' occupation of the nation's capital during the pandemic and local healthcare issues turned the tide.

In Scarborough-Guildwood, a solid Grit riding, Liberal flagbearer Andrea Hazell bested the Tory candidate Gary Crawford 36.55% to 29.57% with NDP nominee Thadsha Navaneethan close behind with 26.19%.

Once the new members are sworn in, the standings in the 124 seat legislature will be:

PC – 81 seats

NDP – 29 seats

Liberal – 9 seats

Green – 1

Independents – 3

Vacant - 1



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
